Mid and East Antrim Borough Council A group of 20 young people took part in a six-month initiative examining the impact of the COVID-19 pandemic on teenagers and young adults in the Mid and East Antrim Borough Council area.

Organised as part of the PEACE IV funded *Youth Active Citizenship Programme*, participants were drawn from a number of local youth and sporting groups including members of Carlisle Coaching; Ballymena United FC; Larne YMCA; and Sunnylands and Woodburn Community Development Group.

Participants were provided with the opportunity to undertake workshops in a range of areas including leadership, communication, emotional intelligence and mental health.

Delivered by Copius Consulting, the project saw Ballymena team players Trai Hume and Ben Wylie deliver a virtual presentation to the groups about the importance of their role in becoming an active citizen within their communities.

The group members then worked on individual pieces; reflecting on their own COVID-19 experience through video, poetry, art and music.
