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SIGNIFICANT PROGRESS AT MONAGHAN PEACE CAMPUS

The Monaghan Peace Campus is creating a new shared community space, comprising of a four-storey, community building and parking in the centre of Monaghan town.

The new shared space has been designed to increase engagement of individuals and communities on a cross-community and crossborder basis through meaningful, purposeful and sustained activities in a proactive programme of initiatives and events.

Core activities that will be explored in the new space will include the impacts and experiences of partition and the conflict; immigration past and present including challenges for BME communities; and culture and tradition, with a focus on exploring and presenting Protestant culture to a wider audience.

The impact of COVID-19 affected the schedule of onsite work, however despite restrictions, works have been ongoing since July 2020 and continued to follow COVID-19 health measures and restrictions (closing from 8 January 2021 and re-opening 4 May 2021).

PLACEMENT STUDENT'S EXPERIENCE AT HEALTHCARE TRIAL PROJECT

The Cross-border Healthcare Intervention Trials in Ireland Network (CHITIN) is a unique partnership between the Public Health Agency in Northern Ireland and the Health Research Board in Ireland, who are working together to deliver 11 Healthcare Intervention Trials (HITs).

The HITs will help to prevent and cure illness and promote improved health and well-being.

The Walking in Schools (WISH) project is just one of such interventions: a peer-led, school based brisk walking intervention for adolescent girls (aged 12-14) which challenges the issue of physical inactivity and aims to overcome barriers to participation.

Caitlin Fallis is a third year, Human Nutrition student at Ulster University. She was afforded the opportunity of a paid placement in the WISH project, as a Research Study Assistant.

Speaking about her decision to pursue a placement Caitlin explained: "There were limited sports activities offered at school that I found enjoyable and I was interested to learn more about why physical activity levels decline among female adolescents. I have a real interest for human nutrition and health promotion." Amongst Caitlin's responsibilities was preparing resources for school visits; data collection, entry and cleansing; transcribing audio files; creating social media content; and attending walk leader training and walk visits.

Caitlin credits written and oral communication; teamwork; time management; confidence development and problem solving amongst the skills acquired through the placement.

I also created educational videos on sports nutrition that were informative, concise and interactive. I'm so proud that they are being built into a learning platform for GCSE students in Northern Ireland."

PROJECT NEWS



The €5m Journey's project recently came to an end with a special celebratory event, where participants, family members and staff reflected upon its transformative impact.

The key aim of Journey's was to enhance the capacity of young people, promote diversity and develop effective relationships to impact community and build a cohesive society.

Led by Springboard Opportunities Limited, with partners Roe Valley Residents Association and Cavan/ Monaghan ETB, Journey's provided meaningful cross-community experiences for 14-24 year olds, particularly those deemed to be at risk. Throughout their four-year 'Journey' young people had life changing experiences, meeting new people from a range of different backgrounds and exploring diversity in a safe environment. Confidence was built through tailored workshops and supportive mentoring, while exploring a range of cultures was highlighted as an area of transformation for young people.

raising awareness for Mental Health, participating in Pride march and the Darkness into Light event.

Throughout the challenges of COVID-19, the programme continued using creative and innovative ways to engage young people online. Participants reflected reflected how this helped structure their day, allowed access to support, provided a focus on something worthwhile and offered a sense of belonging during such uncertain circumstances.

After completing the programme, young people were supported into the next step of their 'Journey'. They had opportunities to flourish in a supportive environment and had transformative experiences, resulting in 100% of participants recommending the programme.

Winter 2009

The PATHS project

(Positive Alternative to Hatred and Sectarianism) helped tackle the issue of anti-social behaviour amongst young people in Derry-Londonderry who had grown up in communities emerging from years of sectarian conflict.

Spring 2010

The €8.3m **Termon shared space** officially opened, promoting crosscommunity interaction between the twin villages of Pettigo, in County Donegal and Tullyhommon, in County Fermanagh.

Autumn 2012

President Michael D. Higgins officially opened the £3.2m, 30-acre, multi-activity, **Castle Saunderson Scouting Centre** in Cavan.

Winter/Spring 2013

A £12m, **50,000 sq ft science park facility** at Fort George in Derry-Londonderry was announced, including a 20,000 sq ft extension to the CoLab facility at Letterkenny Institute of Technology.

CROSS-BORDER LGBT+ YOUTH SERVICE GROUPS JOIN FORCES TO ENGAGE IN OPEN DIALOGUE

Dundalk Outcomers LGBT Support Service and Cara-Friend LGBT+ Youth Service in Belfast, came together for the first time in early 2021 to take part in a six-month cross-border project, which concluded in August.

The project is supported by Louth Meath Education Training Board and Louth County Council through the Small Grants Programme that forms part of Louth County Council's €3.5m Local Authority Action Plan (LAAP).

Bernardine Quinn, manager at Dundalk Outcomers explained that the Open Dialogue Project brought together two LGBT+ youth groups from Dundalk and Belfast "to engage in open dialogue, looking at peace and reconciliation and to explore the history of the North of Ireland, the troubles and where the LGBT+ community fits into that history."

Largely taking place online via Zoom and Discord, the two youth groups were able to meet face-to-face, under COVID restrictions, participating in workshops and events in both Belfast and Dundalk.

"The need for this project emerged when it came to our attention that some of our young people had a fear of attending Newry Pride. There were questions about why there was trouble in the north and what it was about. Even though the Troubles in Northern Ireland had ended a long time ago, there seem to have been some skewed views and some misinformed opinions. Very few of the young people had friends from Northern Ireland or from the Protestant community."

"Dundalk Outcomers set about rekindling old relationships with LGBT+ groups in Northern Ireland and found a perfect fit with our activities and our ethos in Cara-Friend. After some chatting we decided that it would be great to bring these two groups of young people together in order to create a new dialogue for the future." After only two meetings the young people are making new friends and sharing their experience and showing (as we expected) that all of us have more similarities than differences and share anxieties around our sexuality and gender identity. As we look to the future, we see that the Open Dialogue Project is going to create long lasting friendships and more informed opinions and great memories for all involved.

Also discussing the project, was Sadie Ward McDermott, LMETB's Director of FET, who said: "This is an excellent opportunity for LMETB to fund projects which educate participants, as well as the wider community, on the important issues affecting youth on both sides of the border."

Louth County Council's LAAP aims to bring communities from all walks of life together, representing a major economic boost for the area. In total, seventeen peace-building programmes will be delivered.




HEALTHCARE PROJECTS MIDWAY REPORT

The summary report outlines some of ONSIDE's key achievements to date, as well as the challenges faced as part of the COVID-19 pandemic and a look towards future activity.

ONSIDE was developed to address the social isolation often experienced by disabled people and seeks to improve the life outcomes of people with disabilities living in Northern Ireland and the border counties of Ireland through increasing their social and digital involvement in the community.

SOME OF THE KEY EVENTS TO DATE INCLUDE:

International Day of Persons with Disabilities 3 December 2020

Hosted by the Department of Communities and Disability Action NI, ONSIDE presented at a special Zoom event, elaborating on its efforts to make digital communication accessible to all and highlighting how the digital divide is a very real issue for disabled people.

Staff Appreciation Day 2 February 2021

To acknowledge the care and dedication that ONSIDE staff demonstrated with participants during the three COVID lockdowns, the project held a staff appreciation day, bringing the project board and staff together via Zoom to say thank you for their huge effort.

Volunteers' Week 2020 June 2021

To celebrate, ONSIDE ran a social media campaign 'Unlocking the Internet in lockdown' which gave volunteers a platform to tell their stories of volunteering.

RENEWABLE ENGINE PROJECT SHORTLISTED FOR PRESTIGIOUS GREEN GOWN RESEARCH AWARD

The €6.1m, INTERREG VA funded, Renewable Engine Project, led by South West College, was recently announced as a finalist in this year's UK and Ireland Green Gown Awards (which recognise Excellence in Sustainability during Extraordinary Times).

The College is the only further education college on the island of Ireland to make the shortlist and will compete with institutions including Lancaster University, London College of Fashion and University of Portsmouth for the Research with Impact – Institution prize.

Since the programme's launch in January 2017, Renewable Engine has facilitated direct knowledge transfer, technology development and innovation in 10 industrial enterprises, ranging from micro-SMEs to large multinationals, creating new jobs in green industries and sustainable initiatives.

The programme provides partner enterprises with access to academic expertise and has to date, awarded €350,000 in technology development grant funding.

Dr Alistair Quinn, Renewable Engine Programme Manager noted how thrilled the team were with the recognition, adding: "Renewable Engine exists as a unique cross-border platform bringing together research institutes across the areas of Advanced Manufacturing and Sustainable Development. Through direct industry collaborations with organisations, ranging from micro-SMEs to large multinationals, we have been able to create significant impact within the Renewable Energy sector, affording businesses across the programme area the opportunity to access world-leading academic expertise and research facilities."

Winners and highly commended entries will be announced at the Green Gown Awards Ceremony to take place later in the year.

SHARED READING PROGRAMME TACKLING ISOLATION AND LONELINESS DURING LOCKDOWN

The Listen, Share, Change (LSC) project aims to promote positive relations amongst 52 estates across Northern Ireland, celebrating cultural diversity and promoting community cohesion by supporting tenants to live, learn and socialise together; free from prejudice, hate and intolerance.

Each week, a team of trained neighbourhood champions deliver LSC sessions to over 20 community groups. Verbal's shared reading model is used to bring people together to listen, laugh and have a conversation through short stories and share experiences with participants of different backgrounds.

To date, it has benefitted 1,425 participants and successfully adapted its services during the COVID-19 pandemic. "By successfully increasing the accessibility of our online platform we were able to create 24 targeted digital groups and reach 438 participants across Northern Ireland during the initial COVID-19 lockdown period," said Carol Hegarty, LSC Programme Manager.

The project was also able to deliver the programme to new groups, thanks to the support of an incredibly dedicated team of volunteers.

Participants in the project said it allowed them to remain in contact with people during lockdown, with one describing it as a "blessing" and another as a "lifeline" at a time when they were unable to see family. Knowing how much this programme meant to our participants and the emerging need to tackle isolation and loneliness, we set our focus on launching a Digital LSC Programme. With some additional training and support we were able to launch LSC Digital, enabling our participants, both old and new, to join in and enjoy the Reading Room experience from their homes.

Furthermore, LSC has delivered 120 digital tablets to community groups across Northern Ireland which will allow an additional 240 people to take part this year.

ACHIEVING POSITIVE RESULTS AND CREATING REAL CHANGE FOR YOUNG PEOPLE

Nine Northern Ireland YMCA clubs and one YWCA have been involved in delivering the €3.5m m-power project since 2017.

The m-power project incorporated engagement between YMCA clubs in Belfast; Lisburn; Monaghan; Newcastle; Derry-Londonderry; Carrickfergus; Larne; North Down; Portadown and Lurgan.

A relational, youth focused programme, it achieved positive results and created real change for young people who face, and continue to face, numerous challenges and struggles. As well as being presented with opportunities, challenges and hope, young people made deep social and emotional connections.

This was particularly true for those at risk of becoming involved in anti-social behaviour, violence or dissident activity; as well as those struggling within education, training or employment. "When I first came to m-power I was physically and emotionally ruined. With m-power, I felt strong and I could be a voice. Everything in my life was changing, my mental stability was getting stronger and I could stand on my own two feet and to be honest, I couldn't believe the person I was turning into."

m-power also worked with young people with poor mental ill health and physical disabilities, including those with autism and high functioning autism.

Participants were able to celebrate the project's achievements as part of a special, socially-distanced closure event in June 2021.

The Northern Periphery and Arctic (NPA) Programme

This €56million ERDF programme aims to help peripheral and remote communities in the northern regions of Europe to develop their economic, social and environmental potential. The programme area involves parts of Finland, Ireland, Sweden, Scotland, Northern Ireland in cooperation with the Faroe Islands, Iceland, Greenland and Norway. SEUPB is the Regional Contact Point for Northern Ireland.

The North West Europe Programme

This €370 million ERDF programme aims to help make this new region more competitive, environmentally friendly and cohesive by improving access to more and better jobs, enhancing the environmental qualities of the region, improving accessibility and ensuring that cities and rural areas are attractive and sustainable. The programme area is France, the UK, Germany, the Netherlands. Ireland Luxembourg Belgium and Switzerland. The SEUPB works in an advisory and signposting role. The Atlantic Area Programme

The programme aims to achieve progress on transnational co-operation that is geared towards cohesive, sustainable and balanced territorial development of the Atlantic Area and its maritime heritage. The programme region covers all of Ireland and Northern Ireland, and those regions within Portugal, Spain, France and the UK that border the Atlantic Ocean. The SEUPB works in an advisory and signposting role.

INTERREG EUROPE Programme

The €359 million ERDF INTERREG VC Inter-regional Programme is aimed at local and regional authorities. It focuses on the identification, analysis and dissemination of good practices by public authorities in order to improve the effectiveness of regional and local policies.

Co-operation projects are eligible across all 28 EU states, plus Norway and Switzerland.
